From the **Pastor**

"Peace be with you."

In a world marked by wars and atrocities that violate the most fundamental rights of the human person, this is what we need: Peace! We always pray to let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me! I hope you understand the importance of it. How can you become a peacemaker in our times and in our society if you are internally divided. No; we need a change. It is necessary that we receive what Jesus is offering to us: His peace! A peace that is not negotiable or profitable. It is the peace of knowing that it does not matter how hard our battle is because he will be with us until the end, and he will save us. We clearly know that we need freedom and not just a liberator but a savior.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is commissioning his disciples. As they are being sent forth, we also are sent forth! This is the character of the church; to be missionary, to become the mouth of Jesus, to be his feet to run upon his errands and his hands to do his work. But always remember: He is the one who sends us, we rely on his authority. "Without Jesus, the Church has no message, without him she has no power, without him she has no one to turn to when up against it, without him she has nothing to enlighten her mind, to strengthen her arm, and to encourage her heart. It means that the church needs Jesus." (The Gospel of John by William Barclay, Pp, 273.)

"On the other hand, the sending of Jesus is parallel to the sending out of Jesus by God. We must imitate him in his perfect love and obedience to the father. It follows that the church is fit to be the messenger and the instrument of Christ only if she perfectly loves him and perfectly obeys him." (The Gospel of John by William Barclay. p 273.)

Some of us have a serious problem with this. We claim to love Christ, but we don't obey him. We need the guidance of the Holy Spirit! Let our doubts come out. We are like the doubting Thomas—until we see we don't believe! Thomas was a natural pessimist but take courage—Jesus knows our hearts as he knew the heart of Thomas! Remember he knows everything! Today, let us learn from him because he was an honest man with no duplicity and with sincerity. Sometimes we cover our faces with the mask of pride pretending that we know and understand everything, but at the end we are full of confusion and misery. Thomas doubted becoming sure.

Finally, Thomas made a mistake. He withdrew from the Christian community. This is us when we do the same. When we isolate ourselves from our community, we miss what's most important, we suffer loneliness and bitterness and sometimes we harbor resentment. We are the mystical body of Christ; we need to be together. We are here to help each other.

I have never seen in my life a body without a head. Why so much resistance? Why so much division? Remember those organs of the body that seem the most weak or vulnerable are the most important! Like the liver or the heart, you all are important—so please come back. Come back to the Lord and rejoice in his real presence. Believe that he always fulfills his promises. He will be with us until the end.

Please do not forget to pray for our brothers and sisters who are the most vulnerable and the victims of hunger and war around the whole world. But also remember those who are forgotten; the sick, the dying, and the poorest of the poor.

"La paz sea con vosotros".

En un mundo marcado por guerras y atrocidades que violan los derechos más fundamentales de la persona humana, esto es lo que necesitamos: ¡Paz! ¡Siempre oramos para que haya paz en la tierra y que comience conmigo! Espero que entiendan la importancia de esto. ¿Cómo puedes convertirte en un constructor de paz en nuestros tiempos y en nuestra sociedad si estás dividido internamente? No; Necesitamos un cambio. Es necesario que recibamos lo que Jesús nos ofrece: ¡Su paz! Una paz que no es negociable ni provechosa. Es la paz de saber que no importa cuán dura sea nuestra batalla, porque él estará con nosotros hasta el final y nos salvará. Sabemos claramente que necesitamos libertad y no solo un liberador, sino un salvador.

En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús está comisionando a sus discípulos. ¡Así como ellos son enviados, nosotros también somos enviados! Este es el carácter de la iglesia; ser misionero, convertirse en la boca de Jesús, ser sus pies para correr en sus recados y sus manos para hacer su trabajo. Pero recuerden siempre: Él es el que nos envía, confiamos en su autoridad. "Sin Jesús, la Iglesia no tiene mensaje, sin Él no tiene poder, sin Él no tiene a nadie a quien acudir cuando se enfrenta a ella, sin Él no tiene nada que ilumine su mente, fortalezca su brazo y anime su corazón. Significa que la iglesia necesita a Jesús". (El Evangelio de Juan por William Barclay, págs. 273.)

"Por otro lado, el envío de Jesús es paralelo al envío de Jesús por parte de Dios. Debemos imitarlo en su perfecto amor y obediencia al Padre. De esto se deduce que la iglesia es apta para ser mensajera e instrumento de Cristo sólo si lo ama y le obedece perfectamente". (El Evangelio de Juan por William Barclay. pág. 273.)

Algunos de nosotros tenemos un serio problema con esto. Decimos amar a Cristo, pero no le obedecemos. ¡Necesitamos la guía del Espíritu Santo! Que salgan nuestras dudas. Somos como Tomás el incrédulo: ¡hasta que vemos que no creemos! Tomás era un pesimista nato, pero anímate: ¡Jesús conoce nuestros corazones como conoció el corazón de Tomás! ¡Recuerda que él lo sabe todo! Hoy, aprendamos de él porque era un hombre honesto, sin duplicidad y con sinceridad. A veces nos cubrimos la cara con la máscara del orgullo fingiendo que lo sabemos y lo entendemos todo, pero al final estamos llenos de confusión y miseria. Tomás dudó de estar seguro.

Finalmente, Tomás cometió un error. Se retiró de la comunidad cristiana. Esto somos nosotros cuando hacemos lo mismo. Cuando nos aislamos de nuestra comunidad, nos perdemos lo que es más importante, sufrimos soledad y amargura y, a veces, albergamos resentimiento. Somos el cuerpo místico de Cristo; Necesitamos estar juntos. Estamos aquí para ayudarnos unos a otros.

Nunca he visto en mi vida un cuerpo sin cabeza. ¿Por qué tanta resistencia? ¿Por qué tanta división? ¡Recuerde que aquellos órganos del cuerpo que parecen más débiles o vulnerables son los más importantes! Al igual que el hígado o el corazón, todos ustedes son importantes, así que por favor regresen. Regresa al Señor y regocíjate en su verdadera presencia. Cree que siempre cumple sus promesas. Él estará con nosotros hasta el final.

Por favor, no se olviden de rezar por nuestros hermanos y hermanas que son los más vulnerables y las víctimas del hambre y la guerra en todo el mundo. Pero también recuerda a los olvidados; los enfermos, los moribundos y los más pobres entre los pobres.

April 8, 2024

Not a Holy Day of Obligation but Highly Encouraged

The Resurrection, the transformation, the glorification of the once executed and mutilated Jesus — it is too good to keep to oneself. Then, on the way back to Jerusalem, they meet Jesus himself. Jesus is alive. That is what we celebrate.

Cabrini

The new film from Angel Studios about St. Frances Xavier Cabrini—the Italian-born patron saint of immigrants and the first American citizen canonized by the Catholic Church—lands in theaters today. And it lands at a very interesting time when ideological division seems to reign supreme—in the Church, in America, and in the relationship between them.

But with Cabrini, Catholic director Alejandro Gómez Monteverde and the ascendant studio behind The Chosen have something of a crossover hit on their hands. Its mass appeal not only comes through a well-crafted film, but also through its resistance to being pigeon-holed on one side or the other of our deep divides. And this broadness of spirit—this refusal to stay put—is, in many ways, the whole point of the story.

When we first meet Mother Cabrini—a phenomenal performance by Cristiana Dell'Anna, who was perfectly cast—she's being summoned to the Vatican after persistently writing letters about starting a new mission in China. She negotiates her way through the resistance of the cardinal outranking her—the first of many such negotiations for Cabrini—and secures a meeting with his own superior, Pope Leo XIII. The pope relents to her mission, but on one condition: "Begin in the West, not the East." She is to go the slums of New York and minister to Italian immigrants, becoming the first woman to lead a mission overseas.




Yet, more fundamentally, Cabrini is, and remains, a faithful Christian and an obedient daughter of the Church. At the heart of her life are the three theological virtues. She's a woman of faith: "Begin the mission," she repeats, "and the means will come." She's a woman of hope, longing to build an entire "empire of hope" across the world. And she's a woman of charity, ministering to the "least of these" as Christ commanded in Matthew 25. "At the hour of our death," she declares later in the film, "we will all be asked one ques-

tion: What did we do for the poor? The sick? The homeless? For those stripped of dignity?" Indeed, when Cabrini and her sisters first arrive in the Five Points district of lower Manhattan, a squalid slum packed tight with poor immigrants, they see three girls disappear into the darkness and begin to look for them, calling to mind these "sisters" of the divine life. Faith, hope, and charity have vanished in this place, but these Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus make it their business to build a home around them.

In the warm, atmospheric, almost dream-like cinematography of Cabrini, the Statue of Liberty appears twice—and both times at a distance, like a kind of mirage. It's a powerful suggestion of the unrealized ideal of the words it bears, an ideal that Mother Cabrini, rooted in her Catholic faith, might just help us collectively aspire to again: one united nation caring for the tired, poor, huddled masses washed up on, and tossed aside between, its shores.

SAINT OF THE WEEK



ST. GEMMA GALGANI, VIRGIN OF LUCCA, PASSIONIST TERTIARY

St. Gemma Galgani (1878-1903) was canonized by the Venerable Pius XII in 1940. She was a tertiary of the Passionists and was moved by their spirituality of continuous meditation on the Passion of the Savior to lead a life of prayer and penance. Her mystical experiences taught her the value of suffering in union with Christ crucified, and she endured calumnies and opposition even from members of her own family. Demonic persecutions were also not lacking. Her confessor, the Venerable Germanus, a Passionist priest, wrote her biography, and her cause of canonization proceeded, overcoming many obstacles.

The popularity of her veneration has increased over the years, and her insights have been a consolation to many. Her body is enshrined in Lucca in Italy where she spent most of her life, but her heart is enshrined in the Passionist church in Madrid in Spain. The words that follow here are from her brief autobiography, written by order of her confessor; they are characteristic of her spirit and teaching.

Pope's April prayer intention: 'for the role of women'

Pope Francis releases his prayer intention for the month of April 2024, and invites everyone to pray for the role of women. Pope Francis' monthly prayer intention this April is for "the role of women." The Pope invited the Church to pray for this intention in this month's The Pope Video, which is entrusted to the entire Catholic Church through the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network. In The Pope Video for April, the Holy Father insists on the steps today's society needs to take, and asks Christians to join him in prayer "that the dignity and worth of women be recognized in every culture, and for an end to the discrimination they face in various parts of the world."



Pope Francis' denunciation

The Pope in his video illustrates the huge gap that exists between declared principles and actual practice.

"In theory, we all agree that men and women have the same dignity as persons. But this does not play out in practice," he noted. The Pope provides concrete examples, citing "discriminatory laws" currently in force: mandatory dress codes, impediments to ongoing education, denial of assistance for job opportunities. And he recalls that "in many countries, genital mutilation is still practiced."

Thus, he said, "governments need to commit to eliminate" this discrimination and "work toward guaranteeing women's human rights."

He asks us all to respect women, who unfortunately continue to be treated "like something to get rid of," and who are often victims of violence and abuse in many parts of the world, even in countries claiming to be more advanced. "And if we don't [respect women]," the Pope adds, "our society will not progress."

Contradictions still exist

According to a press release by the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network, contradictions are not lacking in today's world.

Whereas in some countries, women have access to education and employment, and occupy leadership roles in businesses and organizations, many still do not enjoy the same opportunities as men.

In the job market, less than one in two women in the world, work, and women earn 23% less than men. The same goes for education, when we consider that women who are literate are in the minority in some countries. For example, the rate is 23%; in Niger, 27%.

Fewer opportunities translate into enormous economic difficulties. According to UN Women, it is estimated that by 2030 8% of women and girls will live in extreme poverty, and 25% of women will not have enough to eat.

Heroines of all times

Father Frédéric Fornos S.J., International Director of the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network, reflected on this month's intention, recalling that "from the beginning, Jesus welcomed women as His disciples. This was a novelty in the society of that time."

"As the Gospels testify," he stressed, "Jesus' mother Mary held a prominent place among the Apostles and in the early community." He also observed that Jesus entrusted the mission of announcing His Resurrection to a woman, Mary Magdalene.

Throughout history, Fr. Fornos reminded, women have contributed to the spiritual dynamism in the Church, citing in a special way Saint Teresa of Avila, Saint Catherine of Siena, and Saint Thérèse of Lisieux, all of whom are Doctors of the Church, along with countless other female saints.


The Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network

El Papa: Alimentemos la alegría de la Resurrección con el perdón, dando testimonio

El Papa Francisco en su alocución previa al rezo mariano del Regina Coeli nos invita a alimentar la alegría de la Resurrección, encontrando a Cristo en la Eucaristía, en su perdón, en la oración y en la caridad vivida, anunciándolo y dando testimonio de esta alegría.

El Papa Francisco en sus saludos después del rezo mariano del Regina Coeli, renovó sus augurios pascuales y agradeció a aquellos que le han enviado mensajes de cercanía y oración; deseó asimismo, que les llegue el don de la paz del Señor Resucitado y que llegue allí donde hay más necesidad: a las poblaciones devastadas por la guerra, el hambre y cualquier forma de opresión.

Hoy lunes de la Octava de Pascua

"Hoy, lunes de la Octava de Pascua, el Evangelio (cf. Mt 28,8-15) nos muestra la alegría de las mujeres por la resurrección de Jesús: ellas, dice el texto, salieron del sepulcro con "gran alegría" y "fueron corriendo a contarlo a sus discípulos" (v. 8). Esta alegría, nacida del encuentro vivo con el Resucitado, es una emoción desbordante, que las impulsa a difundir y contar lo que han visto."

Y nosotros dijo el Papa Francisco, desde nuestro bautismo, podemos celebrar la alegría de la Resurrección, podemos encontrar al Resucitado y Él, como a ellas, nos dice: "¡No teman!" Y si Jesús, vencedor del pecado, del miedo y de la muerte, nos dice que no temamos, entonces -nos anima el Papa a no tener miedo-, no nos aplanemos en una vida sin esperanza, no renunciemos a la alegría de la Pascua.

Al contrario, animó, alimentemos la alegría de Jesús, que es el motor de la vida. Y esta alegría -nos confió el Pontífice- la podemos alimentar día a día, encontrando al Resucitado, porque Él es la fuente de una alegría que nunca se extingue. Lo encontramos en la Eucaristía, en su perdón, en la oración y en la caridad vivida, anunciándolo, dando testimonio. Anunciemos esta alegría, exaltó Francisco, dando testimonio de ella. Porque la alegría, cuando se comparte, aumenta.


La alegría de compartir la Resurrección

Compartir la alegría es una experiencia maravillosa, que aprendemos desde muy pequeños: pensemos -dijo el Papa- en un niño que obtiene una buena calificación en la escuela y no ve la hora de mostrársela a sus padres, o en un joven que logra su primer éxito deportivo, o en una familia en la que nace un hijo. Intentemos recordar, cada uno de nosotros, un momento tan feliz que incluso nos costó expresarlo con palabras, ¡pero que quisimos contar enseguida a todo el mundo!

Aquí, las mujeres, en la mañana de Pascua, experimentan esto, pero de una manera mucho mayor. ¿Por qué? Porque la resurrección de Jesús no es sólo una noticia maravillosa o el final feliz de una historia, sino algo que cambia nuestras vidas por completo y para siempre.

"Es la victoria de la vida sobre la muerte, de la esperanza sobre el desánimo. Jesús ha traspasado la oscuridad de la tumba y vive para siempre: su presencia puede llenar todo de luz. Con Él cada día se convierte en la etapa de un viaje eterno, cada "hoy" puede esperar un "mañana", cada final un nuevo comienzo, cada instante se proyecta más allá de los límites del tiempo, hacia la eternidad".


