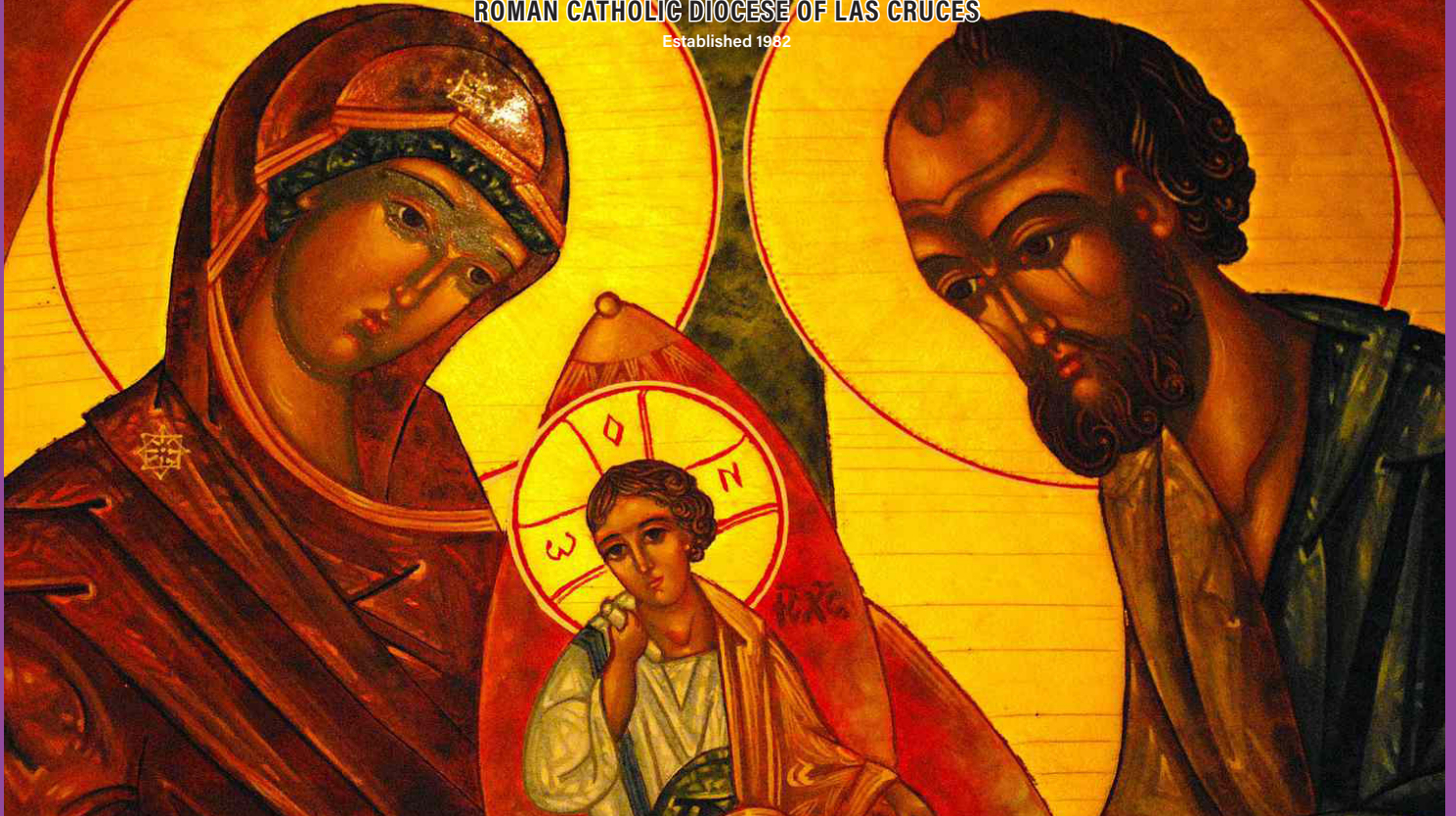

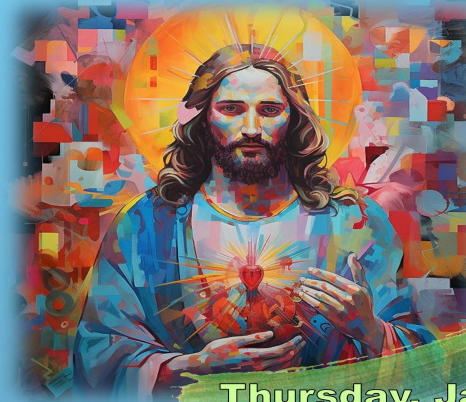

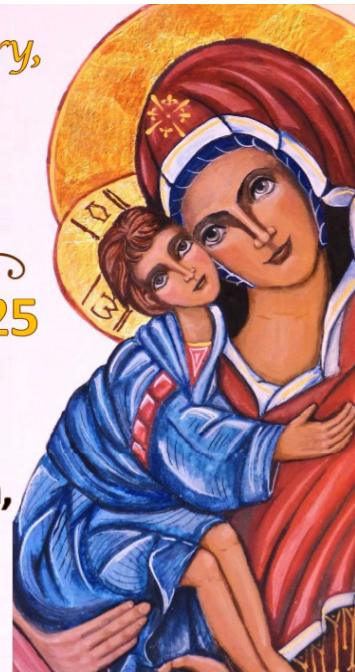

Saint Sylvester, Pope and Confessor

Patron Saint of: Harvests and the chivalric order Militia Auata

Feast Day: December 31



St. Sylvester was the first Pope of Rome to reign entirely under the liberty of the Church. He was elected Pope in 314. He is thought to be the one who converted and baptized Constantine, the first Christian Roman Emperor.

During Sylvester's reign, the city began its transition into its Christian era, with the construction of the great Constantinian basilicas - including the Basilica of St. Peter on the Vatican Hill, which was erected above a temple dedicated to Apollo, to mark the burial place of the first Bishop of Rome. Pope St. Sylvester also contributed to the development of the liturgy.

Pope St. Sylvester is patron of the chivalric order called the Militia Aurata, or "of the Golden Spur", which, as tradition would have it, was founded by Emperor Constantine I in person.

San Silvestre, Papa y Confesor

El Papa San Silvestre también contribuyó al desarrollo de la liturgia.

Pope opens Holy Door at a prison for first time ever

In the Rebibbia New Complex Prison in Rome, Pope Francis opens a Holy Door and celebrates Mass for prisoners.

"I wanted the second Holy Door I open to be here at a prison," Pope Francis explained. For the 2025 Jubilee of Hope, the first Door to be opened was the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on 24 December 2024, then, for the first-time ever, the Pope opened the Holy Door at a prison.

Arriving at the Rebibbia New Complex Prison in Rome, the Pope spoke about the importance of opening the Door there. In front of the prison's chapel, the Church of Our Father, he explained that he wanted everyone to "have the opportunity to fling open the doors to their hearts and to understand that hope never disappoints."

Open doors, open hearts

After walking through the Holy Door himself, the Pope presided over Mass in the church. In his homily, Pope Francis reflected on the historic reason for his visit, describing it as "a beautiful gesture of opening." But more than simply opening doors, the Pope encouraged the prisoners present, to open their hearts. Brotherhood, he said, is "open hearts."

The Pope warned against closed, hardened hearts, which keep us from living. He explained that the Jubilee gives us the grace to "fling open" our hearts to hope. Even in the most difficult and challenging times, he reassured, hope does not disappoint.

Hope is an anchor

Pope Francis likened hope to an anchor on the shore, tied securely with rope. "Sometimes, the rope is hard," he continued, "and it hurts our hands." Yet even in these moments, the anchor of hope keeps us moving forward, because, he said, there is always something ahead of us.

Don't leave it half-closed

"When one's heart is closed, it becomes hard like stone; it forgets tenderness," the Pope cautioned, expressing this is why it is necessary to keep the doors of our hearts open, even in the most difficult situations. He challenged the prisoners present to be open to hope, encouraging them as he said, "everyone knows how to do it."

Pope Francis also explained that everyone knows if their heart is closed or half-closed, and concluded by reminding those present that the Holy Door he opened is "a sign of the door of our heart."

Pope Francis asked for their prayers, telling the group that he truly prays for them, and that it is "not just a figure of speech."

Offering of gifts

At the end of the Mass, some of the prisoners and guards presented the Pope with gifts, including a miniature reproduction of the Holy Door and a basket containing oil, cookies, and ceramics.

The Prison Administration gave Pope Francis a painting of Christ as the Savior created by a former prison officer, artist Elio Lucente. The Pope, in turn, gave the prison a parchment commemorating the event.

Death toll continues to climb on Christmas Day

Palestinian sources say at least 22 people were killed in Israeli airstrikes across the Gaza Strip on Christmas Day.

Palestinian sources say at least 22 Palestinians were killed in Israeli airstrikes across the Gaza Strip on Christmas Day.

Israeli aircraft reportedly targeted tents housing displaced persons in the north of Gaza City.

Civil defense crews recovered at least seven bodies and 25 injured people from the school following the attacks.

Meanwhile, the Israeli Defence Minister Israel Katz has stated that Israeli troops will remain stationed in Gaza to maintain security control, sparking concerns that the latest round of ceasefire talks may face further stalemate.

During a visit to a buffer zone, Katz said security control in Gaza would remain in the hands of the Israel Defense Forces.

Meanwhile, according to reports in the British press, UK Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer has assumed a prominent role in a new international initiative aimed at achieving lasting peace between Israel and Palestine.

Reports say he has drawn upon his experiences in Northern Ireland to support the revival of a program intended to establish a sustainable resolution in the Middle East.

Sir Keir has instructed Foreign Secretary David Lammy to assemble an international summit in London early next year to launch the International Fund for Israeli-Palestinian Peace (IFP), which is endorsed by The Alliance for Middle East Peace (ALLMEP), a coalition of over 160 organizations dedicated to fostering civil society peacebuilding efforts between Israelis and Palestinians.



Pope at Christmas Urbi et Orbi: May we become pilgrims of hope, peace, and unity

Wishing everyone a "a serene and blessed Christmas," Pope Francis celebrates the joy of this day on which we celebrate the birth of Lord Jesus, "the mystery that never ceases to amaze and move us." He underscores how "the door of God's heart is always open" and may we "be reconciled with God" and with one another for a world marked by peace and harmony.

"The mystery that never ceases to amaze and move us was renewed this night: the Virgin Mary gave birth to Jesus, the Son of God, wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger. That is how the shepherds of Bethlehem, filled with joy, found him, as the angels sang: 'Glory to God and peace to men'"

At midday on Christmas morning, Pope Francis gave his customary Christmas greetings and message from the central loggia of Saint Peter's Basilica before the crowds in the square and live to people watching around the world via media. At the conclusion, he imparted his blessing "Urbi et Orbi" - to the city and the world as he also does on Easter Sunday.

The launch of the Jubilee year 2025 marked the theme of this year's Christmas message and context, as the Pope opened the Holy Door of Saint Peter's Basilica at the start of yesterday's Christmas Mass during the Night.

God's heart always open to us

The Pope began his Christmas message explaining that the joy we celebrate today comes from an event that took place two thousand years ago - the birth of the Lord Jesus, the eternal Word of salvation - "made new thanks to the Holy Spirit" and which continues to speak to every man and woman today, saying, "I love you, I forgive you; come back to me, the door of my heart is open!"

He emphasized how "the door of God's heart is always open" and called on us to return to the heart "that loves and forgives us" and lets us be reconciled to Him.

Holy Door of salvation open to all

Recalling the Holy Door he opened in Saint Peter's Basilica yesterday evening inaugurating the Jubilee of 2025, the Pope explained this Door "represents Jesus, the Door of salvation open for all," and the Good Shepherd, who awaits us with open arms.

"Brothers and sisters, do not be afraid! The Door is open, it is wide open! Come! Let us be reconciled with God, and then we will be reconciled with ourselves and able to be reconciled with one another, even our enemies. God's mercy can do all things. It unties every knot; it tears down every wall of division; it dispels hatred and the spirit of revenge. Come! Jesus is the Door of Peace."

Courage to cross the threshold

The Pope acknowledged how crossing the threshold of that Door requires courage because we have to sacrifice our old ways and mindset, putting behind us disputes and divisions, and surrendering ourselves to God's love.

"This Christmas, at the beginning of the Jubilee Year, I invite every individual, and all peoples and nations, to find the courage needed to walk through that Door, to become pilgrims of hope, to silence the sound of arms and overcome divisions!"

May weapons be silenced

Turning to the challenges facing our world, the Pope prayed that the sound of weapons may be silenced in war-torn Ukraine and urged for a strength and openness to negotiation and dialogue for a just and lasting peace.

He prayed for an end to war in the Middle East, recalling the Crib of Bethlehem and Christian communities in Israel and Palestine. He prayed especially for Gaza, where the humanitarian situation is dire, saying "may there be a ceasefire, may the hostages be released and aid be given to the people worn out by hunger and by war."

Pope Francis also expressed his closeness to the Christian communities in Lebanon and in Syria in the midst of transition. He prayed "the doors of dialogue and peace be flung open throughout the region, devastated by conflict." He also encouraged the people of Libya as they work for national reconciliation.

Humanitarian help for the suffering

The Pope prayed the birth of the Saviour we celebrate today may inspire hope for the many thousands of children suffering from a measles outbreak in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Burkina Faso, Mali, Niger and Mozambique. He pointed out how this humanitarian crisis is due primarily to human causes - armed conflicts, the scourge of terrorism - and worsened by climate change, forcing the displacement of millions and putting many at mortal risk.



The Pope remembered the peoples of the Horn of Africa, praying for "the gifts of peace, concord and fraternity" for them, as well as the civilian population of Sudan, so that desperately needed humanitarian aid may reach them and new ceasefire negotiations may take place.

Prayers for dialogue and social harmony

May Christmas bring comfort to the people of Myanmar, the Pope prayed, where the ongoing conflict has inflicted great suffering and displaced so many.

Remembering the Americas, the Pope encouraged political authorities and people of good will to work together to overcome divisions with justice and truth and to promote social harmony and the common good to which people aspire. He mentioned Haiti, Venezuela, Colombia and Nicaragua.

The Pope remembered the people of the island of Cyprus, now fifty years a divided island, praying that the walls of separation may come down and that a mutually agreed upon solution can be found in full respect for the rights and dignity of all communities.

Jesus awaits us

"Jesus, the eternal Word of God made incarnate, is the wide-open Door that we are invited to enter, in order to rediscover the meaning of our existence and the sacredness of all life, and to recover the foundational values of the human family."

The Pope underscored how Jesus awaits us at the threshold, "especially the most vulnerable," such as the children suffering due to war and hunger, and the elderly often forced to live abandoned and in solitude. He described how the Lord awaits those who have lost homes, fled homelands for safety, lost jobs and cannot find one, those in prisons, and people enduring persecution for their faith.

Gratitude for all

The Pope praised those who give of themselves in service, doing good, and helping others, remembering parents, educators and teachers, "who have the great responsibility of forming future generations." He thanked healthcare workers, service men and women, charitable organizations, and especially missionaries throughout the world as "they bring light and comfort to so many people in difficulty."

Forgive our debts

In conclusion, the Pope prayed that this Jubilee offer an opportunity to forgive debts, especially of the poorest countries. We are all called to forgive others, as "the Son of God, born in the cold and darkness of the night, has forgiven our own," the Pope recalled, and as the Lord "heals us and forgives us."

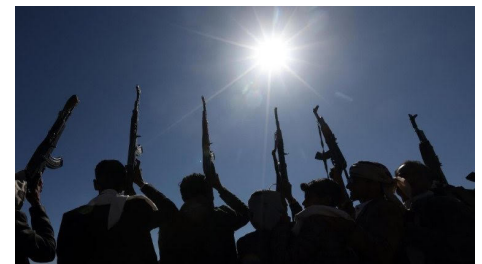

La iniciativa tiene como objetivo aliviar a los países oprimidos por una deuda insostenible y promover el desarrollo.

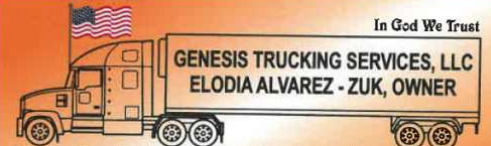
